
The Royal Mint's 2021 Icons

This year, we've released some really eye-catching coins, which focus on the work that made each icon or team they celebrate famous. On the coin in honour of John Logie Baird, a clever design shows the timeline of television being created and the three designs commemorating Mary Anning depict some of the most famous prehistoric creatures she discovered.



Team GB have travelled all the way to Tokyo in Japan to compete at this year's summer Games. Even though we can't support them in person, we'll be able to watch the events on TV thanks to John Logie Baird!

DID YOU KNOW?

The Royal Mint has been making coins for hundreds of years. We used to make our coins in the famous Tower Hill in London but now they are struck in Llantrisant. All UK coins feature Her Majesty The Queen on one side (the obverse) so it's a big honour for our British icons to feature on the other side (the reverse) of these coins.



Sir Walter Scott is no stranger to appearing on money as his image can also be found on many Scottish banknotes.

John Logie Baird is known as 'The Father of Television' as he demonstrated the first television in 1926.


Clue C:

DID YOU KNOW?

One of H.G. Wells' most famous pieces of writing is *The War of the Worlds*, which was published in 1898. In 1938, it was broadcast on the radio in a performance delivered by Orson Welles, as if it was a real radio broadcast of an actual alien invasion – imagine turning on your radio and hearing that!
