Great sadness was felt at The Royal Mint following the passing of His Royal Highness The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, as it was by millions of people in the United Kingdom and across the world. The Royal Mint had a long and close relationship with The Duke of Edinburgh as he served as President of The Royal Mint Advisory Committee (RMAC) for 47 years between 1952 and 1999. Over the next few pages, we reflect on our association with Prince Philip and celebrate his life and legacy.



Made to Honour a Life Well Lived

Following the announcement of the passing of His Royal Highness
The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh on 9 April 2021, many reflected
that his was a life well lived. As a man of action and significant
achievements, Prince Philip became a naval commander at a
young age and provided constant and steadfast counsel to
Her Majesty The Queen throughout her reign. When his young wife
took on the role as monarch, the newly titled Duke of Edinburgh
supported her, showing tireless commitment to his duty.

In honour of this remarkable man, The Royal Mint has created a memorial coin to celebrate his life and legacy. The design features a portrait created by Ian Rank-Broadley FRBS that was personally approved by The Duke of Edinburgh. The fourth definitive coinage portrait of The Queen was also created by Ian Rank-Broadley and it was a design that was overseen by Prince Philip in his role as the President of The Royal Mint Advisory Committee (RMAC).

Memories From The Royal Mint

The Duke of Edinburgh served as President of The Royal Mint Advisory Committee (RMAC) from 1952 to 1999. During Prince Philip's tenure, Graham Dyer OBE, Senior Research Curator at The Royal Mint Museum, held the position of Assistant Secretary of the Committee from 1976 to 1996 and Secretary of the Committee from 1996 to 2003. Here, Graham Dyer recounts his memories of this time.

"When I joined The Royal Mint in August 1961 I became aware, almost immediately I think, of the role of Prince Philip as President of The Royal Mint Advisory Committee and of the pride that we all felt in his direct association with us.

"He had occupied this role since the accession of The Queen in 1952 and, in fact, one of my earliest jobs was to draft a review of the work of the Committee in his first ten years as President. The draft must have been pretty awful because the idea of a review was quietly dropped, but I could not have had a better introduction to what the Committee was about.

"It was not, however, until March 1976, when I became Assistant Secretary to the Committee, that I actually witnessed Prince Philip in action. As President he chaired the meetings and it was accordingly his job — not the easiest — to bring the distinguished and diverse members of the Committee to a consensus view on the designs in front of them. I was not sure what to expect, but I quickly became a fan, finding him an efficient and effective chairman, aware that there was an agenda to get through and seemingly with an instinctive sense of the time available for each item on the agenda.

"For their part, members of the Committee were too distinguished to be overly deferential and if, as happened occasionally, he found himself in the minority then he cheerfully gave way.

Only once do I remember him pulling rank.

This was when a proposal came before the Committee for a crown piece to commemorate the 40th anniversary in 1987 of his marriage to The Queen. Designs had already been obtained from artists but it was immediately obvious that Prince Philip hated the idea. He complained that the Mint evidently did not think he and The Queen would reach their golden wedding anniversary and members were happy to join him in dismissing the idea with good-natured scorn.





"The Committee was something that Prince Philip seemed to enjoy and I remember being told that, busy as he was, a meeting of the Committee was one of the first things to go into his diary each year. Part of the reason for this, I am sure, was that he cared about good design. It was a recurring theme with him that, because coins tended to be round, designs should be circular like the reverses of the 1953 florin and sixpence, rather than having a top and a bottom. He would also say that, in the interests of unity of style and treatment, it was better if obverse and reverse could be designed by the same artist.

"When in the early days the Committee still looked at coins for Commonwealth countries, his knowledge and experience of local customs, of local fauna and flora, proved invaluable. But it was with medals that he really came into his own. No one on the Committee could match his knowledge of medals, decorations and regimental badges and in this respect he

could bear comparison with the renowned ability of his father-in-law George VI.

"We were, indeed, very lucky to have his services, given the important matters that came before the Committee during his time as President. At the start he was actively involved in the preparation of the full range of coins, medals and seals required for The Queen's reign, happy to assist progress by talking to the artists himself. This was followed in the 1960s by the time-consuming development of designs for the new decimal coinage, where his skill and tact were deployed in full measure to avoid confrontation with James Callaghan, then Chancellor of the Exchequer. Subsequent years saw a succession of commemorative coins, of new circulating coins like the £1 and 20 pence, and changing portraits of The Queen, where we had the benefit of knowing that as the portraits took shape Prince Philip was aware of the views of The Queen. Medals remained a special interest and I think he particularly enjoyed seeing the

Conspicuous Gallantry Cross work its way through the Committee.

"His Presidency came to an end in 1999 when, conscious of his advancing years, he felt that he should be scaling down his commitments. We were of course keen for him to continue but he could not be persuaded to stay, though he retained an interest in the work of the Committee. This was evident in March 2003 when I stood down as Secretary and Prince Philip did me the honour of attending the farewell lunch that followed my last meeting, driving to Cutlers' Hall close by St Paul's Cathedral in his famous black taxi. And even more so in 2008 when he not only agreed to provide a foreword for the official Royal Mint publication inspired by the new reverse designs by Matt Dent but discarded the draft supplied by the Mint and wrote it himself – a personal foreword that will stand as a symbol of his significant contribution to numismatic design."

A Lasting Legacy at the RMAC


As President of The Royal Mint Advisory Committee (RMAC), Prince Philip's role was to lead the group of people overseeing the design of coins, medals and seals of the United Kingdom and to ensure the quality of the designs. He united the Committee's experts with good humour and a sound understanding of the importance of the nation's coinage.

His appointment coincided with the death of George VI, The Queen's father. It was a difficult time for the Royal Family, and The Royal Mint was tasked with creating a new suite of coins, medals and seals, featuring a portrait of the new monarch for the fifth time in just 50 years.

The Duke of Edinburgh provided a direct link to The Queen and voiced his opinion on the likenesses of his wife created by artists. He was present at The Queen's sitting with Mary Gillick, offering encouragement and advice as the artist worked on the first coinage portrait of the monarch.

Prince Philip carried out his role with great dedication and interest for more than 40 years, overseeing the creation of four of The Queen's portraits and the coins for decimalisation, and remained president until 1999.







The Royal Mint has struck coins for Her Majesty The Queen's Silver, Gold and Diamond Jubilees, along with her significant birthdays and anniversaries. Now, in 2021, we find ourselves marking yet another monumental royal event – The Queen's 95th birthday.

As the world's longest reigning living monarch, Queen Elizabeth II has been a reassuring presence through constant change. During her first televised Christmas speech, she made a poignant pledge to give her heart and devotion to the people of Britain and the Commonwealth. It's a promise she has kept throughout her remarkable reign, with an aura of grace and good humour that has endeared her to the hearts of millions.

Many public moments in Her Majesty's life have been recorded on our coins as part of the story of Britain. The Royal Mint struck her very first coins, and since her first effigy appeared – a portrait of a young monarch – we have witnessed the passing of time with four more definitive coinage portraits.

Behind the public face of the monarch,
The Queen has travelled the world during
her reign and has had the opportunity to
experience lands, people, art, history, science,
society and more on a vast scale. And perhaps
it is when her public duties mirror her own
personal interests that we see a sense of joy in
the woman who has dedicated her life to duty.
Just as public and private lives come together,
so too do The Queen's passions and her coins.

Whilst many of us fill family albums with photographs and mementos of our families, the pride that The Queen finds in her family is also reflected in the UK's commemorative coins. As well as striking coins celebrating occasions in the lives of Her Majesty and

her late husband, His Royal Highness
The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh,
we also strike coins honouring the
births, marriages and anniversaries within
the Royal Family, including those of
The Queen's children, grandchildren and
great-grandchildren. Perhaps the most
poignant examples in recent years include
the coins struck to honour four generations
of the Royal Family and the centenary of
the House of Windsor; both coins featured
designs with softened, heraldic symbols,
to represent the growth of the family, with
acorns turning into mighty oaks through
the generations.


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Mark a Royal British First

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Behind The Design

With Timothy Noad

Her Majesty The Queen's 95th birthday is such a special occasion that two designs have been created for our commemorative coin collection celebrating this royal milestone.

The reverses of the £5, two-ounce gold Proof, two-ounce silver Proof and quarter-ounce gold Proof coins feature a design created by the calligrapher and heraldic artist Timothy Noad, who is renowned for his attention to detail and use of both traditional and modern techniques. His designs have featured on Her Majesty The Queen's Golden and Diamond Jubilee Medals and he has worked on several projects for The Royal Mint, including the House of Windsor Centenary £5 coin, the Four Generations of Royalty £5 coin and coins within our Tower of London collection.

Her Majesty is well-known for her love of nature and flowers, a passion that Timothy Noad shares and often uses as inspiration for his work. "I am inspired by many things, including real plants and flowers, seventeenth-century Dutch flower paintings, and the pattern designs of William Morris. I liked the idea that a posy or bouquet is often presented to The Queen, perhaps on her birthday, and that this could be a tribute from the four nations of the United Kingdom."

As a scribe and illuminator to HM Crown Office at the House of Lords, Timothy is used to creating formal designs and documents.

However, for this piece it was important to balance the royal theme with an element of informality for this more personal occasion. "For this design, I made the flowers more naturalistic and less formal than usual, for example, the rose at the top. I originally experimented with using spring flowers but eventually settled on the national floral emblems – thistles, daffodils, roses and shamrocks – which are tried and tested in coin designs and connect Her Majesty to the four UK nations."

The final design has a tapestry effect, with the Royal Cypher standing out against a mass of delicate leaves and flowers. Whilst he generally works with traditional symbols, Timothy did go against the norm with one element:

"I felt that Her Majesty would prefer to be given a daffodil rather than the more heraldically correct Welsh leek!"

The inscription that appears on the £5 coin features words that have been taken from The Queen's first televised Christmas broadcast in 1957, and can be found on all of the coins in this celebratory collection.

"I can give you my heart and my devotion to these old islands and to all the peoples of our brotherhood of nations ..."

The £5 coin is available as a gold Proof, silver Proof and silver Proof Piedfort edition and a Brilliant Uncirculated edition. The two-ounce gold, two-ounce silver and quarter-ounce gold Proof editions also feature Timothy Noad's design. In addition to these, the collection includes fine gold and silver editions, which feature a design created by sculptor Gary Breeze. His richly symbolic 'flourish' design represents The Queen's nine decades with nine roses, whilst 54 leaves signify the countries of the Commonwealth.





Behind The Design

With Gary Breeze

Gary Breeze is a designer and sculptor with a background in letter carving. His works appear in major collections around the United Kingdom, and this is the sculptor's third project for The Royal Mint.

He designed the 50p coin that marked the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Britain along with the £2 coin that honoured the famous diarist Samuel Pepys. He also created a design that spanned three £2 coins in celebration of the 250th anniversary of Captain James Cook's voyage of discovery.

Gary's coin designs are richly detailed and reveal narratives that you might miss if you don't look closely.

"I like to make sense of things in my design and add hidden meanings. The original design has been honed at each stage of production to make sure the details work at close scrutiny."

At a first look, the sculptor's coin design for The Queen's 95th birthday is a beautiful, floral arrangement but there are very carefully considered elements. There are nine roses, one for each decade The Queen has lived through, and 54 leaves on the face of the coin, each representing a country of the Commonwealth, one of Her Majesty's greatest legacies. These tiny details all spring from 'flourishes', which are used in heraldry and calligraphy as Gary explains:

"You'll see it on paper money, official documents, and even royal signatures have shown very elaborate flourishes. Some flourishes reminded me of streamers that might be thrown or seen at parties ...The flourishes I designed may look symmetrical at first, but when you look closely there are four intertwining and organic 'shoots'."

The design by Gary Breeze can be seen on the gold Proof and silver Proof five-ounce and kilo coins in the collection.





Making Change


Coins from The Royal Mint often record important occasions and momentous events but sometimes they make history themselves. In 1971, the UK's coinage changed from the centuries-old pounds, shillings and pence to a new, decimal currency. That day became known as Decimal Day and The Royal Mint faced the monumental challenge of striking billions of new coins in preparation.

Far from being an overnight switch, decimalisation took many months of careful planning, a new factory and machinery, new production techniques and processes, and a huge information campaign.

Five decades later, we celebrate the 50th anniversary of Decimal Day with a new 50p coin, featuring a reverse design created by Dominique Evans, a senior designer at

The Royal Mint, and Jody Clark's definitive portrait of Her Majesty The Queen on the obverse. Inspired by the currency that was replaced in 1971, the reverse design conveys the transition from pre-decimal to decimal coins.

The coin is available as gold and silver Proof Piedfort editions, gold and silver Proof editions, and a Brilliant Uncirculated edition.

Reminiscence Sessions with The Royal Mint Museum

Handling and chatting about pre-decimal coins can be a positive and nostalgic experience for people who lived through the changeover so, as part of the 50th anniversary celebrations, The Royal Mint Museum has developed reminiscence sessions.

The reminiscence session takes the form of a 'Museum in a Box', which contains replicas and original objects from the time for people to handle. Each object is fitted with a special micro-chip which, when placed on the box, play audio clips specific to that object. This can be a fun and stimulating activity, giving people who lived through

the changeover an opportunity to talk about their memories.

The Royal Mint Museum is working with care homes to run these sessions and those who are interested have the opportunity to borrow the boxes completely free of charge, with the boxes being quarantined and thoroughly disinfected between each loan.

How did you approach designing this coin?

"I feel it's so very important that the subject is at the heart of the design. My true love is research and idea generation. However, with a subject as important and personal to all as diversity, I felt the design needed to come from a place of sense and research. I have my own account of the twists and turns in my life, yet never more so for this design. It was crucial I look far beyond myself and across everyone and everything, listening to and imagining the difference of experience connecting us through our generations, genetics and lineages.

"The sense of the word 'connection' continued to rise in my journey through my research. I also kept feeling and seeing the stark reminders of fractured connections that can, in contrast, separate and divide."

Did you draw inspiration from anything in particular?

"I remember the day vividly. I was at my grandmother's house by the sea and I sat in the garden looking up at the seagulls flying together in the sky, apart yet connected by the wind. When I went inside I wrote the words 'Belonging Under One Sky'. I always find that words give clarity to thoughts – especially

when moving from researching to creating. From there I wrote a short piece within which are the words, 'I believe, no matter who we are, where we are born, live and call home, we are all born and belong under the same sky. Time gives us age, ethnicity our appearance and circumstances our status, yet we all begin our lives with the ability to learn, understand, accept and love. Our beliefs may make our lives feel worlds apart, identity sometimes somewhat of a curiosity, yet we can still connect, develop bonds and grow stronger together.'"

How did you arrive at the final design?

"The shape of the coin was and is always very important. I initially looked at the angular nature of the fifty pence coin, and from there I explored creating areas of connection and a shape symbolising all the points of connection having to work together. Some shapes that I created looked aesthetically pleasing, but I felt it would be more appropriate for the shape to be more defined and robust. I was fascinated by how it could be a shape that could itself become a symbol, and how it could also have impact within the structure of the coin.

"A shape that seemed very appropriate was the geodome; a sphere made up of a series of interconnecting lines and triangles that form a network, each part as important as the other in creating a symbol of connection and strength."

What does this design mean to you personally?

"The importance of understanding, connection and belonging have been at the heart of this project and I will always hold this time as such a treasured memory - from working on the coin design to seeing the activity packs heading out to every primary school in Wales and England. These packs encourage children to design a coin based on their own perception of diversity and who in their lives inspires them. I'm seeing such positivity growing around all the projects that the schools have been sharing with us, some of whom we've been in contact with already. And it's through that positivity that I hope pupils will become inspired and connected, celebrating the diversity of others and enabling each of them to be who they are, in individual, wonderful ways."

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Belonging Under One Sky

Britain's history is rich and diverse. For more than 1,100 years, the nation's story has been told through coins struck by The Royal Mint, a narrative carried in the pockets and purses of all its people. The contribution of ethnic minority communities has been such an important part of that story but has often gone unrecognised. This coin has been created to celebrate all the people who have made Britain what it is today.

The coin design by Dominique Evans features the words 'DIVERSITY BUILT BRITAIN' on a structure composed of interconnected triangles. The lines are linked to form a network, with each part just as important as the next in uniting the whole composition.

This design signals a change in UK coinage to ensure it is more inclusive of the individuals, events and communities which built a diverse Britain, with more designs set to follow.



Adam Hargreaves had always been keen on drawing. He was like his father, Roger, in that way, the man who created the world of Mr. Men Little Miss. If you've ever picked up one of the dozens upon dozens of Mr. Men Little Miss books, you'll have seen Roger's signature right there on the front.

Despite having a father who almost certainly could have provided good contacts, Adam decided at a relatively early age that he couldn't make a living from art and decided to have a go at farming instead. By his own admission, he wasn't terribly good at it but he gave it his best effort. Then, in 1988, when Adam was just 25 years old, his life changed. His father suddenly and unexpectedly became ill and passed away at the age of 53.

The family was shocked and heartbroken but one thing was clear: they wanted what Roger had started to carry on, and they wanted the family business to stay in the family. It was a big ask, but eventually the responsibility of keeping the Mr. Men Little Miss characters alive was placed on Adam's shoulders. In a lot of ways that made sense: he was the eldest of the children, he was artistically talented, and he had helped to inspire the whole thing in the first place.

That inspirational moment had come in 1971, when Adam was 8 years old. Back then, Roger Hargreaves was a successful copywriter who yearned to spend more time with his family. Keen on drawing from an early age, he enjoyed making sketches and thought he might like to create children's books but couldn't quite figure out how to get the ball rolling. That was until Adam playfully asked his father what he would later describe as 'an impossible question': what does a tickle look like?

Roger's initial response was playful, but the question continued to spin in his imagination and eventually he created the first of many Mr. Men characters: Mr. Tickle. These were quickly followed by icons like Mr. Happy, who features on one of the UK coins we have struck in




celebration of 50 years of Mr. Men Little Miss. Getting the books published was initially a little tricky, with a number of traditional publishers rejecting the idea. However, once Roger found a home for Mr. Men the idea took off and within three years the first books had sold more than 1 million copies.

When Roger passed away, Adam inherited a world of stories and characters loved by people around the world but later admitted to feeling a certain amount of pressure to get things right. His father had been so full of energy and playfulness, and Adam worked hard to adapt his style to better reflect that of his father. He has often said that one of the difficult characters to master was Mr. Happy, whose almost perfect circular shape Roger had been able to draw freehand.

Eventually, Adam honed his skills enough that he felt confident presenting new characters of his own. Amongst the first of those were Mr. Cool and Little Miss Whoops, who were introduced in 2003. Since then, the world of Mr. Men Little Miss has roughly doubled in size, with books to be found in multiple languages and dozens of countries around the world. All the while, Adam has remained integral, continuing to serve as the series' primary illustrator. He does sometimes think forward to a time when he might choose to put the pen down but, when that day comes, he hopes the characters will carry on.







Coining Change

This year marks the 50th anniversary of one of the biggest changes to Britain's coinage that the nation has ever seen – decimalisation. However, UK coinage had been evolving for centuries and The Royal Mint has been right at the heart of every major change.

The Coinage of Charles II

When Charles II was restored to the throne of England in 1660, he came back to a country which had experienced great upheaval since the start of the civil wars some 20 years earlier. The nation had seen death on a hitherto unimaginable scale, including the execution of a king, the institution of a republic in the Commonwealth and, finally, a military dictatorship under Cromwell.

The nation's coins reflected these changes in their designs but one aspect of the coinage that had remained largely constant throughout was the method of production. Coins were still struck out by hand, just as they had been for centuries, but it was a method that was becoming increasingly outdated in Europe. When Charles II returned to England, he and those of his entourage who had spent time in exile abroad would have cast an unfavourable eye upon English coinage when comparing it to that of its continental neighbours. Produced using modern machinery, and much closer to coins in use today, these were vastly superior to the thin, often ill-defined coins in use in Britain.

This partly explains the change that occurred in the 1660s. The Royal Mint saw the introduction of new, modern production methods with coins being manufactured using horse-drawn rolling mills and screw presses, just like their continental cousins. Much thicker, enabling the addition of milling and edge lettering, coupled with greater relief, these new coins were a distinct improvement. It wasn't, however, until the significant logistical challenge of the Great Recoinage in the 1690s that damaged, worn and underweight coins were finally removed from circulation.

The Coinage of George III

A common theme throughout the history of The Royal Mint is its ability to respond effectively to the need for change, just as with the decimalisation programme of the late 1960s and 1970s, or the recoinage in the 1690s. Large-scale, periodic recoinages were to be expected and the end of George III's reign bore witness to such an event.

By 1815, the British coinage was in dire need of reform. More than 20 years of war with France had taken its toll but this had only exacerbated an underlying problem. Throughout George III's reign barely any silver coins were struck and there was a chronic shortage of small change. This was largely the result of silver being worth more as bullion than it was as coinage, stemming from a system which relied on pieces having their intrinsic value in the metal content.

The Battle of Waterloo finally brought to an end the war with France and peace allowed an opportunity to reform the coinage system. The changes enacted instituted a significant recoinage, and silver began being struck in large quantities again but only as a token coinage, or rather one that did not rely on the weight of silver to give the coin its value. Overseen by the Master of the Mint, William Wellesley Pole, a brother of the Duke of Wellington, millions of new coins were produced ahead of their distribution to the public in February 1816.



today, so too, perhaps surprisingly, are those of the coinage reforms of George III's reign. The changes enacted then heralded the introduction of the modern Sovereign, the coin which The Royal Mint still makes to this day, to the same specification and virtually the same design envisaged by Benedetto Pistrucci more than 200 years ago.
